Could you create a colorful and detailed painting ... without using your hands?

That was the task presented to students at Crown Road Campus recently after listening to a talk by Dennis Pullen, an artist from Oswego. Pullen, who grips paintbrushes in his mouth to create vibrant images of animals, landscapes and more, shared his story of overcoming hardship after he was struck by a car in 1987 while walking home from school in a snowstorm. Paralyzed from the neck down, he

uses a ventilator to breathe and a wheelchair to get around. Despite these challenges, Pullen's story of becoming an artist and inspirational speaker demonstrated exceptional resilience for about 50 students from the Crossroads, Reach, and middle-school Special Education programs who attended his presentation as part of Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month. At the end of Pullen's talk, students were invited to create their own masterpieces in a similar fashion, using just their mouths to dip Q-tips into paint and draw on a clipboard. To be inducted, students must have an 85 average or higher, 12 or fewer absences, and a teacher endorsement. Students must also demonstrate attributes that include respect, honesty, skill, responsibility, leadership, service and citizenship. Students from the New Vision Environmental Science class in Cortland recently developed a premium dog food that included these essential ingredients. With a few additional ingredients, creative marketing, and the guidance of their instructor, Chad DeVoe, 22 students in the class walked away with a first-place prize among 50 high school entries in the second-annual Top Cut Beef Contest, which is sponsored by the New York State Beef Council and New York Agriculture in the Classroom. Seal of Biliteracy booms across Central New York

Three years ago, six high school students from Solvay received the New York State Seal of Biliteracy in a program piloted through the Mid-State Regional Bilingual Education Resource Network, or RBERN. This year, that number has exploded. In



one day alone, 174 students from 11 Central New York school districts showcased their speaking skills in 23 languages. Students gave their Seal of Biliteracy presentations April 9 in buildings spread across the Onondaga Community College campus and at the OCM BOCES Main Campus in Liverpool. If a student qualifies for the seal, which is affixed

to their diploma, it shows they have high-level proficiency in speaking, reading, writing and listening in a language other than English. The honor also comes with a blue-and-gold medal from the New York State Education Department, which students can wear with their graduation robes. 
Seven Valleys students skype with internationally famous "earth-caster"

Students in an Earth Design class at Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland recently connected virtually with internationally-known elemental artist Thomas Sayre. Sayre creates unique sculptures called "earth castings" by digging into the ground with shovels, bulldozers, and heavy construction equipment. He uses the tilled ground as a mold for concrete and rebar and raises the sculptures to create giant rings, pillars, and other shapes. Students in the Earth Design class have been working on a related project called "Weathered," in which they created rugged wooden canvas art pieces that were exposed to the elements over the snowy winter recess. They connected with Sayre as an expert in the field to learn and ask questions, which were generated as a group using Right Question Institute's "Question Formulation Technique."
