

Welding lab renovation offers more space, more opportunities for students

A large crowd of visitors joined students and staff Feb. 5 for a ceremonial ribbon cutting and open house at our newly renovated welding lab at the Cortlandville Campus. Check out this great story in The Cortland Standard.



The lab grew from 14 to 21 booths and now offers state-of-the-art equipment and more than twice the space as before, allowing students to work on bigger projects in a safer, more flexible environment. Best of all, students learned from the renovation: They took part in the demolition, learned from contractors about piping techniques and career possibilities, and created much of the equipment that complements the project: storage shelves, a scrap bin, booth numbers and more. They even welded the posts to hold the ribbon for the ribbon cutting. At the Open House, students demonstrated their skills and impressed their guests, which included numerous school and industrial leaders. Henry served as district superintendent of Tompkins-Seneca BOCES before taking on the same role as district superintendent of OCM BOCES for many years. He retired in 1984. As many of you may know, the "Henry" Career & Technical Education building at our Thompson Road Campus is named after Irv Henry because of his longtime dedication and commitment to the students and staff of OCM BOCES. Crystal R. Smith Award last

passed away in August after a 1 ½-year battle with breast cancer. Runyan received the award because she exemplifies many of the characteristics of Crystal.

Adult Education Director **Mari Ukleya** told graduates and their loved ones that Crystal "was a true educator and mentor to students and staff alike. She gave the program great leadership. Crystal was an individual who believed ethics and integrity were paramount. Crystal believed in our students and in their potential, even when students themselves did not believe."

Welding student earns Eagle Scout rank

In the world of Boy Scouts, the highest possible rank is Eagle Scout. In fact, only four percent of all Boy Scouts earn the honor, according to the Boy Scouts of America website. One of our students, **Joshua Dashnaw**, achieved that designation recently after managing a 20-person crew to



enhance a train exhibit last summer at the New York State Fair. Working 12-hour days in the month leading up the Fair, Dashnaw and

his team built staircases to reach a caboose and a bridge between train cars so Fair-goers could avoid walking on the tracks.

In a recent interview, Dashnaw said it took eight years of work and growth through Boy Scouts to achieve Eagle Scout. His love of the State Fair project, which involved welding, led him to the welding program at OCM BOCES for his senior year. He plans to pursue welding as a career through our Adult Education programs. No matter what his future holds, Boy Scouts will be part of it. Dashnaw is an assistant scoutmaster for Troop 210 in

Kirkville, which has 24 members. His uniform sports 56 merit badges, a welding badge included. "It feels great," he said of his Eagle Scout honor, "because it's been a long journey."

Pipeline to Leadership: New partnership focuses on developing strong school leaders

A new program aimed at recruiting teachers and preparing them to become top-quality school administrators will kick off next fall as the result of a partnership between OCM BOCES, 22 Central New York school districts and five higher education institutions in New York State.

The **Aspiring Leader Institute** will address a growing need for effective administrators by building a pipeline of candidates who are "motivated, trained, mentored and dedicated to providing excellent leadership in our schools, one of the essential ingredients for student success," OCM BOCES District Superintendent Jody Manning said.

3D printing and robot design: Seven Valleys students connect with Incodema

Students taking Regents Physics at Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland recently visited Incodema 3D in Freeville, N.Y., to learn about their metal manufacturing process. Science Facilitator Jake Melynk said students toured the factory, where engineers 3D-print their own proprietary nickel-based alloy to design parts for aeronautics, engines, and Department of Defense projects. Sound impressive? Students are learning about Newton's Laws and Forces and will be using a CAD-based program similar to that used by the Incodema engineers to design their own robots.

The podiums are designed to hold colorful Post-It notes, written by teachers, that show "expected learning outcomes" for students. The podiums were part of a Project Based Learning initiative that combined the talents of two classes: Students in **Duane Debejian's** welding classes built the podiums, and students in **Matt**McGivney's auto collision classes painted them to perfection. Research + Food = Great PBL Project with Wegman s

The smell was intoxicating: Shepherd's Pie, fresh pierogis, sushi, spiral pasta, and Chinese chicken and vegetables. The foods created by Chef Corey Jordan at the Wegman's on Taft Road represented a culminating event for middle-school Reach students engaged in Project

Based Learning. Students researched countries, pieced together tri-fold presentations, and displayed them at the grocery store so patrons could walk by, answer questions and taste authentic food. Students researched Italy, China, Japan, Poland and Ireland. They calculated the nutritional value of the food, graphed immigration trends, compiled statistics and wrote descriptive "letters" pretending to be new immigrants to the United States. **Tamil Hordge** of Liverpool said he loved his country of interest, Japan, where the concept of drifting, a driving technique, was born. "If I could live anywhere," he said. "I'd pick Japan."
