Employees Now Have Immediate Access to Material Safety Data Sheets for Products Used at OCM BOCES

OCM BOCES employees now have easy access to Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) with just a few clicks of their

mouse! The OCM BOCES Health, Safety and Risk Management Office, through MSDS Online Inc., is now providing immediate access (via the internet) to the MSDSs of all products used at OCM BOCES. Through the system it is now possible for our employees, as well as those of our component districts, to utilize the database through the OCM BOCES website.

In order to search for a product's MSDS, simply go to the Health & Safety web page at http://www.ocmboces.org/teacherpage.cfm?teacher=1493 and click on the MSDS Search button. Scroll down to the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES and click to begin your search. It is not necessary to create a user account or a password.

Utilizing data submitted through our internal Product Usage Record Form, we have 'captured' the MSDSs for products listed and pulled them into an electronic folder specific to OCM BOCES. Additional sheets are continually being added as product inventories are provided.

The government is now recognizing the provision of MSDSs through electronic systems as being in compliance with regulations. This recognition reduces the burden of maintaining multiple paper copies of a product's MSDS at every location.

Departments who regularly keep hard copies of Material Safety Data Sheets are welcome to continue. Backup paper copies of MSDSs are also maintained by the Health & Safety Office.

All new MSDSs (or copies of) received at our sites should continue to be sent to David Daignault, Safety Coordinator, at the OCM BOCES Administration Building in Syracuse. As always, please write the department/class using the product and the site location on the sheet to help us properly identify the MSDS.

In an emergency, a Material Safety Data Sheet can also be obtained through the "FAX by Demand" system by calling I-888-362-7416 at any time, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year!

Flu: Two types of injections are available this year. BOTH are equally effective and utilize the same flu serum.


Intramuscular (the traditional shot) \$34

Intradermal (New this year - injection between skin layers - needle is pen-tip size) 41

Pneumonia: 72 - Recommended every 5 years for those with chronic respiratory disease, asthma, heart conditions or smokers

Payment can be made by cash or check, payable to Regional Medical Services. Insurance reimbursement can be submitted for flu and pneumonia shots given at this clinic. No payment is necessary for individuals with Medicare part B or most Medicare Advantage plans. If you plan to submit for insurance reimbursement you MUST complete the insurance form at the clinic.

Kari Shanahan, OCM BOCES Healthy Schools New York Leadership Program Coordinator recently graduated from Ladder to Leadership, an elite 16-month leadership development program. Shanahan will take the knowledge she has gained through the program and apply it to her position at BOCES.

Ladder to Leadership: Developing the Next Generation of Community
Health Leaders is a national initiative of the Robert Wood Johnson
Foundation (RWJF) in collaboration with the Center for Creative
Leadership. The aim of the initiative is to enhance the leadership capacity of
community-based nonprofit health and health-related organizations serving
vulnerable populations. The Ladder to Leadership program was facilitated in
Central New York across several counties, and focused on the development



of critical leadership competencies for 27 mid-career professionals through an innovative, I 6-month leadership development curriculum. The 27 fellows were divided into five (5) Action Learning Teams, each with a project to improve their individual leadership capacities and to impact a specific health concern in Central New York.

Kari's team's project was to create a movement that changes the health reform dialogue from financial to one focused on health care as a human right. In addition to her team project, other aspects of the curriculum included a mixture of face-to-face training sessions, individualized executive coaching and mentoring.
