Mark Pettitt began working for OCM BOCES on September 8th, but he is no stranger to a BOCES. Mark's work history includes nearly 20 years of service at Delaware-Chenango and Jefferson-Lewis BOCES. His history with BOCES includes negotiations, grievance and arbitration, labor relations and working with personnel policies and procedures. Mark has already met several times with his staff here at BOCES and in the next month, he will be taking time to meet the superintendents and board members of our 23 component districts. In addition to his responsibilities at OCM BOCES, Mark serves as the treasurer of a statewide group of BOCES, a position he has held for 16 years.

Immediately prior to coming to OCM BOCES, Mark served as the Chief Human Resource Officer for Webster Central School District. Because Mark's most recent job history is with

a school district, rather than a BOCES, he says working at OCM BOCES is like "coming back home".

As you look around the many buildings and other facilities that make up OCM BOCES, you will notice some of the many projects that occurred this summer and several that are still ongoing. Our facilities team has done an outstanding job of renovating, constructing, reconstructing buildings and accommodating our new programs and staff. Some of the many projects that you will take note of:

- Cortland adult education programs moved from the Center for New Careers building on Port Watson Street in Cortland to the McEvoy Educational Campus.
- The Cortland Alternative Junior High has relocated to the Cortland Alternative School (formerly Center for New Careers) on Port Watson Street to create one Alternative School that houses students in grades 7-12.
 Major renovations were done in this building to create classrooms, and a computer lab, cafeteria, library, and science lab.
- A new bus loop was constructed at the Henry Educational Campus at the front of the Career and Technical Education building. The main bathrooms in the CTE building were updated to make them ADA-compliant.
- The Henry Campus Administration building is now home to GED and Project Effective Parent programs as well as audiologists and teachers of the visually impaired.
- The McEvoy Educational Campus is currently undergoing pavement repairs and will also have the main bathrooms updated to make them ADA-compliant. Additionally, the overhead doors in construction trades room will be replaced.


- At the Kasson Road School, a fire alarm system upgrade was completed.



Career Academy Students Tour SPCA as Part of Careers II Class

On Friday, September 18th, students in Leah LaChausse's Careers 2 class at OCM BOCES Career Academy visited the Central New York SPCA and were given a tour of the facility by employee, Stephanie Woyciesjes. Students are in the process of working with the SPCA to see how they can help the organization to help animals. They have consulted the SPCA's wish list and have come up with ideas for items they can make in class to donate and/or sell, and give the money to the SPCA.

Included in their product criteria was the requirement of making products out of recycled or donated materials. Some of the objects to be created include cat scratch posts, leashes, toys, biscuits, pet shampoos, and blankets. Career and Technical Education students will demonstrate construction ideas (for the posts), and recipes for making animal biscuits and shampoo.

In order to complete their projects for the SPCA, Career Academy students are

asking for donations of the following items: feathers, fleece, fabric, stuffing, carpet scraps (big

enough to cover a foot tall 4x4 post), soap flakes, flour, oat meal, peanut butter, plywood, large and mini hot glue gun stix, leash clasps, thin wooden dowels (1/4 in), 3/4 in wide **non-satin** ribbon and catnip.

LaChausse's class is working with the SPCA as part of the "Teacher in the World of Work" program, aimed at working with local businesses and organizations to provide students with proper job training and to help them gain the experience they need to become job ready upon graduation. A secondary goal of the program is to break down negative stereotypes that may exist about teenagers and alternative students.

Teaching American History Grant Enters Third and Final Year at BOCES -



The Teaching American History Grant's third year participants met each other and learned about the project specifications at the grant's initial meeting on September 30th.

On Wednesday, September 29th, a group of almost 40 social studies teachers met for the first time to begin year three of a nearly \$1 million grant on "Teaching American History." The grant, again being led by OCM BOCES Staff Development Specialist, Daryll Wheeler, is particularly exciting this year, it's third and final, due to the fact that the cohort is not only from OCM BOCES, but includes teachers from 20 of our 23 component districts! Districts involved include Syracuse City School District and the Diocese of Syracuse, Baldwinsville, Cazenovia, Chittenango, East Syracuse-Minoa, Fabius-Pompey, Fayetteville-Manlius, Homer, Jamesville-Dewitt, Liverpool, Lyncourt, Marathon, Marcellus, McGraw, Onondaga Central, Solvay, Tully, West Genesee and Westhill.

The focus of this year's grant is on post-World War II America and the Civil Rights Era. Participants will take part in monthly historian-led professional development sessions, including instructional strategies for teaching the material in their classrooms, a summer institute and evaluation study activities. Additionally, the group will take a field trip to Washington, D.C. in April/May as a way of viewing the city from an historical perspective and hearing "background" stories.

OCM BOCES' Daryll Wheeler is currently working with Kevin Sheets, Associate Professor of History at the State University of New York at Cortland and other project members in order to provide participating teachers with sustained professional development and build a district and regional community of instructional best practices on American History.
